

WHAT YOU MIGHT SEE ON **YOUR WALK**

COTTONGRASS: Cottongrass is common in moist ground. It is easy to recognise on account of its soft, fluffy flowers.

MAP LICHEN: Did you know that lichens consist of a fungus and an alga that live together? Photo: Harnish Moore

WILLOW GROUSE (Lagopus lagopus): Have you heard the male's call? It is a loud go-back go-back. Photo: Hamish Moore



ALPINE AZALEA (Loiseleuria procumbens):

Description of the walk

WALK OF MEDIUM DIFFICULTY with beautiful panoramic views of Vrådal and the lakes Nisser and Vråvatn. This makes a lovely walk, whether you choose to go the whole way or only part of it. After you get past Stemnetten, there are 360-degree views the whole way. The ground is mainly rock, but there are some damp stretches. Wear good footwear and a windbreaker!

YOU CAN START at Vrådal ski centre and head up to Tverrfjellet, either by cable car or on foot. You can also start at Stemnetten. Take the road with the toll barrier (there is a box where you can pay) to the top of the hill. The path, shown in red on the map, starts there, and heads past Luktarhola, Sveigefjell, Brennstøylnuten and Hægefjellskardet, and on up to the top of Mount Hægefjell. From Hægefjell you return by the same path. It is also possible to continue down to Nissedal and Fjone.

Driving direction



Start in the centre of Vrådal. Follow route Rv. 38 from Vrådal towards Dalen for approximately 3.5 km.



Turn left towards Osen and Vrådal Panorama. Follow the signs for approximately 1.3 km.



Turn right towards Vrådal ski centre and then keep left towards the toll barrier.



Drive past the toll barrier and follow the road to the top of the hill. Remember to take cash with you.



There is a parking area at the top. (GPS: N59°17.195′ E008° 24.957′)

You are responsible for your own safety during your walk. Treat the countryside and grazing animals with respect. Take only photos, leave only footprints. Please take your rubbish home with you. Have a great walk!
